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# Toll of Refugio Oil Spill Continues to Rise

In the 15 days since the devastating Refugio oil spill cast a black pall over the Gaviota coast, the havoc it has wrought on our beaches, the ocean, wildlife and our community has continued to grow. The toll on wildlife has risen dramatically in recent days, with 145 oiled birds (58 alive, 87 dead) and 93 mammals (40 alive, 53 dead) being found to date. The number of fish and invertebrates affected is unknown but is undoubtedly far greater. The extent of fouled shoreline has grown to more than 40 miles, and tar balls have begun washing up on beaches as far south as Ventura, Los Angeles and even Orange counties. Refugio and El Capitan State Parks and 138 square miles of fishing grounds have been closed indefinitely, causing harm to our local economy. These impacts will likely continue to escalate in the coming days, weeks and months as the true scope of this terrible tragedy becomes more painfully clear.

Channelkeeper is working with our environmental partners, including the Environmental Defense Center and the California Coastkeeper Alliance, to investigate the circumstances behind the spill and to advocate for policy reforms to ensure that a disaster like this can't happen again. Channelkeeper is also coordinating with Unified Command and other scientists to augment official monitoring efforts in the near term, including of potential impacts to the Naples Marine Protected Area, and also hope to develop additional monitoring efforts to assess the impact of the spill over the longer term. In addition, we're compiling observations from community members, and have designed a reporting form for volunteers to fill out and submit, along with photos, if they spot oil on the beach or water. However, please do not attempt to clean up oil or tar balls from the beach or water or to rescue oiled wildlife. Use our form, and call (800) 424-8802 or (805) 696-1188 to report tar balls or oil on beaches or the water, and call (877) 823-6926 to report oiled wildlife.

Finally, we're working to keep the public informed about the spill. won the first critical victory in our lawsuit to restore flows in the Ventura River.

The City of Ventura pumps hundreds of millions of gallons of water from the




Ventura River each year, even though the river has been designated by the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) as impaired by excessive pumping and diversions. Studies commissioned by the City itself have concluded that the City's pumping has a significant negative impact on the river and endangered species like steelhead trout. Moreover, the SWRCB has a constitutional duty to prevent the unreasonable use of state waters. Despite this, the City has continued to pump, and the SWRCB has done nothing to stop it. This continued over-pumping has put the health of the river - and the life it sustains in serious jeopardy.

At the April 23rd hearing, the Court overruled the SWRCB's and City's objections to our lawsuit and affirmed that the SWRCB has a mandatory duty to prevent unreasonable use of state waters. Channelkeeper's lawsuit, which seeks to compel the SWRCB to conduct a "Reasonable Use Analysis" of the City's use of the Ventura River, can now move forward. Our hope is that such an analysis will ultimately require the City to better balance the various demands for water with the health and vitality of the Ventura River and lead to more sustainable and integrated management of its water resources.
