SUCCESS! Channelkeeper Compels City of Santa Barbara to Reduce Sewage Spills

In mid-January, Channelkeeper and the City of Santa Barbara finalized an agreement to extend the settlement we signed in 2012 to reduce sewage spills. The 2012 agreement, which was set to expire in early 2017, required the City to increase the level of effort and funding to repair and replace leaking sewer pipes and progressively reduce sewage spills. Unfortunately, however, the City exceeded the maximum number of spills allowed under our 2012 settlement in 3 of the first 4 years of the 5-year agreement. Therefore, in 2016 Channelkeeper initiated negotiations with the City, which culminated in an agreement to extend our 2012 settlement for an additional 3 years, require specific improvements to the City's sewer pipe cleaning, assessment, and spill response protocols, and further reduce sewage spills. Channelkeeper commends the City for committing to these actions, and we look forward to working with them to better protect public health, aquatic life and our local economy from harmful sewage spills.



Rein the Rain with Rain Barrels



Despite the recent rainfall throughout California, Santa Barbara's main water supply, Lake Cachuma, is only at 12.9% capacity and our region remains in an extreme drought. Water conservation must continue to be a way of life for the South Coast. Sustainable and water-wise landscapes can save water and look pretty too. Many local water districts have rebates available to make landscapes more sustainable with water-wise plants and smart irrigation.











Through our Rein the Rain Project, Channelkeeper is partnering with local vintners and brewers to secure oak barrels previously used to age wine and beer and convert them into rain barrels to help our community conserve water. We have several beautiful, repurposed oak rain barrels available for sale for \$100, which includes a DIY kit to connect the barrel to your rectangular roof downspout. Rain barrels not only promote water conservation but also reduce stormwater runoff, our number one source of water pollution. Many thanks to our barrel


Stream Team February 4th & 5th
