Sewage Spills in Santa Barbara Decline



Last week, the Santa Barbara City Council received an update on the City's progress in reducing sewage spills, which declined from a high of 41 in 2009 to 7 in 2018, or by 83 percent thanks to improvements driven by a legal settlement with Channelkeeper. Channelkeeper filed suit against the City in 2011 for violations of the Clean Water Act related to its inordinately high rate of sewage spills, and we signed a settlement agreement in 2012 which required the City to significantly increase its level of effort and funding to repair and replace leaking sewer pipes and progressively reduce sewage spills. As a result, the City has invested an additional \$20 million since 2012 to improve its spill response and reporting protocols, enhance sewer pipe inspection and cleaning efforts, and repair or replace 38 miles of sewer pipe (equivalent to 15 percent of its entire 257 miles of sewer mains), including 10 miles of pipes that were identified as having a high risk of leaking to storm drains, creeks and the ocean. Channelkeeper applauded the City's progress in testimony before City Council last week, and urged them to continue the added investment and progress in reducing spills beyond 2020, when our settlement with the City terminates.

Setting Common Sense Limits on Fertilizer

Application for Farms

Fertilizer contains nitrogen that easily moves through the soil when it rains or crops are irrigated. When more fertilizer is applied than crops can utilize, the leftover nitrogen migrates through the soil and contaminates groundwater supplies and adjacent springfed streams, rivers, and wetlands.

Over-application of fertilizer is the biggest source of pollution to our groundwater

supplies. According to the Central Coast



Regional Water Quality Control Board, over half the nitrogen applied as fertilizer by farms ends up as waste discharged to the environment. Currently, farms discharge **ten times** more nitrogen on average than levels deemed protective of drinking water and the environment. To address this problem, the Regional Water Board is proposing, for the first time ever, to limit egregious over-application of fertilizer. Channelkeeper is working to promote the adoption of such limits, and we will be asking for community support later this summer when the Water Board releases a proposed update to its existing agricultural pollution regulations. Channelkeeper Comments on Exxon's Proposed Interim Oil Trucking Project

Santa Barbara County released a <u>Draft</u>
<u>Supplemental Environmental Impact</u>
<u>Report (SEIR)</u> to evaluate the impacts of trucking crude oil from ExxonMobil's Santa Ynez Unit facility in Las Flores Canyon while



the EIR for a new pipeline is developed to replace the one that ruptured and caused the Refugio Oil Spill in 2015. The proposed project would allow up to 70 trucks a day, 24-hours a day, seven days a week to transport crude oil from three offshore platforms to two processing facilities and could last for seven years, with the potential to be extended. Channelkeeper reviewed the SEIR and is preparing written comments outlining concerns related to extending the operational lifespan of the platforms, among others. The County is accepting public comments on the SEIR until June 4th, and the Planning Commission is expected to review the project in the fall.



Lands to Drilling and Fracking

The federal Bureau of Land Management (BLM) recently released a <u>Draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement</u> (SEIR) that analyzes the impacts of opening more than <u>one million acres of federal</u> and private lands across nine counties in California from Monterey to Ventura, including several parcels between Lake Casitas and the Pacific Ocean. This action would end a five-year moratorium on leasing federal lands in California to

oil and gas developers. Channelkeeper is reviewing the SEIR and will submit comments by the June 10 deadline. Comments can be submitted through the BLM website or Los Padres Forest Watch's on-line portal.
