THIRD ANNUAL LOBSTER TRAP CLEANUP COLLABORATION A SUCCESS

On Saturday, April 22nd, twenty-three Watershed Brigade volunteers and members of the commercial fishing community worked together to remove more than thirty lobster traps that had washed ashore between Leadbetter Point and Mesa Lane!

Volunteers pulled traps from the rocks along the shore and carried them to collection points on the beach. The traps were clipped onto a buoyed rope and winched through the surf to the Bella B, a commercial fishing vessel owned by fisherman, Chris Voss.

We'd like to thank Nick Tharp from First Light Fishing Co. and Henry Hepp for ferrying the buoy line back and forth from boat to shore by kayak and to Kim Selkoe, Executive Director of Commercial Fishermen of Santa Barbara, and colleagues Ava Schulenberg and Chris Voss for loading the traps onboard the Bella B and transporting them to Santa Barbara Harbor for disposal.

This is our third year of collaborative shoreline cleanups and we're super grateful for this great community effort!















STUDENTS LEARN ABOUT WATER QUALITY TESTING

This spring, we are happy to be back out at the Ventura River estuary providing outdoor education and experiences for students from the Ventura River watershed with our partners at Once Upon a Watershed.

On these field trips, students learn about water quality testing and use their skills to test the water themselves at the estuary to see if conditions can support the endangered southern California Steelhead trout. We love engaging with students and providing them with firsthand experiences in the Ventura River that bring environmental science to life.

Each year, thousands of Mylar balloons blow from the mainland and litter our ocean, where they can be mistaken as food by sea creatures or entangle wildlife. We encourage our community to avoid using balloons. Instead, choose ecofriendly alternatives and take the pledge to be Mylar-free at MylarMistake.com. However, if you decide to use balloons, please be sure to secure them well and toss the deflated remnants in the trash. Deflated Mylar balloons can also be dropped off at Channelkeeper's office to be recycled.





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
