



TACKLING MARINE DEBRIS AT THE CHANNEL ISLANDS

In May, Channelkeeper staff and volunteers partnered with fishermen and local organizations to clear approximately 5,763 pounds of trash and debris from Chinese Harbor on Santa Cruz Island.

This is the fourth year of collaborative cleanups at the Channel Islands for Santa Barbara Channelkeeper, the National Marine Sanctuary Foundation, Santa Barbara Adventure Company, Island Packers, and the Commercial Fishermen of Santa Barbara. This year, Tidy Seas supported the effort as well.


Trash from the mainland and lost fishing gear are carried out into the Santa Barbara Channel and beyond by ocean currents and waves. Some of this debris washes up on the remote shores of the Channel Islands, while other persists in the Pacific Ocean.

The large amount of debris that had accumulated in Chinese Harbor—including tires, irrigation pipes, fishing gear, plastic, and metal—was shocking to volunteers, especially considering that this group cleaned the same beach last fall.

During the cleanup, twenty-nine volunteers spread out along a two-mile stretch of beach to collect debris. They ferried the debris from shore using kayaks and

skiffs and loaded it onto boats waiting offshore. The boats brought the debris back to the mainland for disposal.

This Channel Islands debris removal program is funded by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Marine Debris Program through a contract with the National Marine Sanctuary Foundation to remove marine debris from five different marine sanctuaries across California, Washington, and the Gulf of Mexico.



CHANNELKEEPER BOARD MEMBER MIMI DEGRUY SHARES OCEAN FILMS

For Channelkeeper's May Board Walk, award-winning filmmaker and board secretary Mimi deGruy shared film footage captured in and around the Channel Islands. The presentation included selected clips from three films she and her late husband, the underwater cinematographer Mike deGruy, completed for National Geographic, the BBC, and PBS between 1989 and 2003.

Technical and artistic feats of underwater cinematography dazzled a packed auditorium at the Santa Barbara Maritime Museum, starting with a macro look at a baby shark emerging from its egg case. Rich in narrative, the inclusions also captured the devastation of an El Niño year on sea stars and sea lion populations, the agility of an octopus mastering a maze, the beauty of nudibranchs and other jewel-like creatures living in the holdfasts of giant kelp, and more.


VISIT TIDEPOOLS AND HELP COLLECT DATA

Our colleagues at the California Academy of Sciences are looking for volunteers throughout California to join the <u>2024 Snapshot Cal Coast</u> event from June 1st to June 30th. You can help document California's incredible coastal biodiversity!

Snapshot Cal Coast is an annual statewide community science effort that encourages people to make and share observations of plants, animals, and seaweeds along the California coast using the <u>iNaturalist</u> app. The goal is to create a valuable snapshot in time of where species are located along our coast.

Participants are asked to visit a local beach or tidepool and, using the iNaturalist app, take photos and make observations of seaweeds, plants, and animals. Local areas of particular interest include Coal Oil Point in the Campus Point Marine Protected Area and the Carpinteria Tar Pits.

Be sure to follow the <u>Snapshot Cal Coast 2024</u> project in iNaturalist and use the #SnapshotCalCoast hashtag when recording your observations. Enjoy the tidepools and please remember to follow tidepooling best practices for your safety and the protection of wildlife. Never remove any animals or seaweeds, take care to step on bare rock wherever possible, never move animals from place to place, and leave the tidepools as you found them. Check the <u>NOAA</u> tide tables for info.

It's More than Just Sand - An Interpretive Walk Exploring the Hidden Ecology of the Sandy Beach Habitat with Boardmember Bob Warner Thursday, June 20
Goleta Beach Parking Lot (West/UCSB Side)

Channelkeeper's June Board Walk will be an interpretive stroll on the most extensive intertidal habitat in Southern California, the sandy beach. Participants will meet at the western (UCSB) end of the Goleta Beach parking lot on June 20, 2024, at 3 pm.

Join us to learn about the hidden ecology of this extremely important habitat. This short hike will be led by board member Bob Warner, Research Professor of Marine Biology at UCSB.

The walk includes an easy saunter along the beach. Participants should wear shoes appropriate for the beach (or no shoes at all!) and bring a hat, jacket, water, and sunscreen.

Channelkeeper Board Walks are occasional walks and talks around town to explore water from different perspectives. They are designed for the whole community to understand our place in nature, especially with respect to lifegiving water. Each is led by a Channelkeeper board member, drawing upon their expertise as naturalists, hydrologists, nature film producers, native plant gardeners, and more.
